Moncler SpA (Moncler), an Italian manufacturer of sports apparel for mountaineering,¹ has taken basic steps to address forced labor risks in its supply chains. It discloses less information than the global sector average. Other European luxury apparel companies such as Burberry or Hugo Boss disclose taking stronger steps. Moncler does not disclose any steps it has taken to address the risks of alleged Uyghur forced labor across its supply chain tiers.

Moncler has adopted a supplier code of conduct that addresses the ILO core labor standards and states that suppliers are contractually obliged to adhere to the code. It also has a whistleblowing mechanism open to suppliers and their workers through which grievances involving violations of its Code of Ethics, which addresses the ILO core labor standards, can be made.

Additional steps the company could take include

- disclosing internal responsibility and board oversight for implementing its supply chain policies;
- disclosing the names and addresses of its suppliers and data points on its suppliers' workforce; and
- assessing forced labor risks in its supply chains and disclosing the risks identified.
